NEW MODEL

LONG-AWAITED 125CC ROADSTER

Yamaha has released a new all-purpose roadster, 125 A-7 which is a long-awaited modified version of 125 YA-6.

In addition to improvements done to internal mechanism ensuring higher performance, the 125A-7 has numerous eye-

catching features in appearanec, such as cross-shaped fins, stream-lined fuel tank, larger lighting equipment, novel ribbon tyres and sharp-designed air-cleaner. A single autolube engine develops dynamic and flexible power at any riding condition.

Most notable is that the 125 A-7 ensures smooth and reliable riding on any snowy ground with chained tyres. Yamaha 125A-7 will do a lot of things for a lot of people!

YAMAHA KEEP TRIUMPHAL GOING

Though both lightweight titles had been clinched already, Yamaha teamsters continued to dominate the 125cc and 250cc races in the Finnish GP and Ulster GP. P. Read became the magnificent doule winner in the Finnish GP on August 4. But, in the Ulster round held two weeks later, B. Ivy won both races to regain the lead in the individual 250cc title contest.

Finnish GP-Imatra

In the 125cc race P. Read, the 1968 champion dashed to gain the 200-yard lead from a flying start, B. Ivy relentlessly accelerated his Yamaha to close the gap and stay into Read's slipstream, setting up a record lap. Ivy, however, had to stop for front brake adjustments which made Read's lead consolidated. Read won the race at a record average speed.

The 250cc dice was much more exciting for the 1968 individual title. After shadowing Ivy, Read gradually nipped shead. Ivy tried to keep pace on a wet track. Luck turned against Ivy ! He spun off and knocked his leg. With Ivy out, Read rode his Yamaha into the easiest win.

B. Ivy won the 125cc race after a tremendous duel with his team-mate, P. Read. His average speed of 99.65 mph was a record faster the old lap record!

In this race P. Read established a lap record at 102.44 mph while chasing Ivy.

The vital 250cc race was fought between them more fiercely than.

Read took the lead for the first five laps with Ivy staying into his slipstream. Ivy went ahead on the following lap, and on the 9th lap, a flung up stone punctured Read's radiator, causing him to retire. Ivy won this most important race, regaining the lead in the title contest with 46 points to Read's 44.

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




