Young American tackles Japanese auto dealer

Even in Wakkanai city, located in northern Hokkaido, Yamaha autocycles enjoy ever increasing popularity. One dealer who is making steady sales progress is Tako Motors. Ever since Yamaha was first established, Tako Motors have been right there in the van of all new developments and models. At the moment they are dealing with a wide variety of Yamaha products including autocycles ranging from 50 to 350 cc, sports models, scramblers and trail models, in fact, 44 different types of Yamaha autocycle. Other Yamaha products on show at Tako Motors are motorboats, outboard motors, snowmobiles etc., etc. The Manager of Tako Motors, Mr. Tako himself, was once bitten by the auto-race bug and could be seen riding around Hokkaido following the circuit. His shop is always full of autocycle enthusiasts creating a really heat atmosphere.

Recently a young foreigner was living above Tako Motors and used to take a hand with sales and equipment ete. His sales technique was quite good and many a customer got a surprise when he spoke; as his Japanese was pretty fluent. As soon as the telephone rang he'd pick it up and say "hai" (yes) and then get down to business. His biggest customer was the U.S. Army service station where he had a monopoly on sales and services. His name, by the way, is Bruce Brown aged 22. He was drafted into the U.S. Army when he was eighteen and after serving in Turkey got a transfer to Wakkanai Air Station where he stayed for three years working at the service station. A good worker, conscientious, and an excellent salesman.

Mr. Brown first got aquainted with Mr. Tako at a motocross. He was greatly impressed with Mr Tako's sincerity and experience. Since then, he's been staying at Tako Motors spending all of his spare time in sports, business and service. Last October he came third in the Shibetsu motocross held by the Japan Motor Cycle Society.

Mr. Brown, who has become an experienced manager of Tako Motors, has some great plans for the future. That is to work for Yamaha. After his hitch in the Army was over, he went back to Boston where his parents live but because he still had his plans for the future, he came back to Japan to work for Mr. Tako again.

His plan entails him being trained in advanced sales techniques by Mr. Tako and, if possible, he wishes to finish off his studies at Yamaha's head office in order to go back to the States as a fully trained sales engineer. Mr. Brown fully understands that the autocycle is the ideal machine for both sport and business: practical, convenient, inexpensive. He also knows that in the future the demand for autocycles will grow and grow and Mr. Brown hopes to grow with it.







Finnish GP-

Diding a Yamaha production racer 350 TR-2, Kent Andersson brilliantly won the 350cc race of the Finnish GP, the 9th round held on the 3.7 mile Imatra circuit on Angust 3.

K. Andersson, a Swedish snowman attired in a brand new set of white leathers, led the field in a shocking and spectacular way. For the latter stage of 21-lap race, he made his lead unchallenged, setting a new lep record of 2' 32" 1, breaking the old record made by M. Hailwood on a works Honda in 1966. Hurling a high performance Yamaha and beating all of works machines such as MZ, Ossa and Benelli, K. Andersson finished first to grab the second win in the '69 title contest.

Yamaha Outspeeds MV

-Czech Grand Prix-

R. Gould riding a Yamaha TR-2 gave G. Agostini on a works MV one of the Quite a sensation was caused at Mallory Park, England during an International race meet. In this race Ron Gould on a Yamaha 350 TR-2 won over Italian G. Agostini riding a MV 500 works racer. The surprise took place during the main event, a 20 lap race for 1,000 cc bikes. R. Gould, who had already studied the course before the race, displayed amazing skill and staying power to beat G. Agnostini one of the top class racers. During the race, R. Gould led the field and matched dust with the Italian ace, finally flashing past the finish line in a well-earned victory.

Yamaha Racing Highlight

Entered in the race were BSA's. Triumph's and Norton's, all on their home ground, but it was Yamaha who stole the show with it's 350 TR-2 displaying powerful accelerating, marvelous brake control and superior steering. Right through the races it seemed it was Yamaha's day with a victory by R. Gould followed by P. Read and from there until sixth place all riders were on Yamaha 250 TR-2's In the 350 cc class, first place went to R. Gould, second to Charterton and third to P. Read : all members of the Yamaha team. Yamaha's initiative in all races was most impressive to all present.




R. Gould on a Yamaha giving an Italian ace one of the hardest races. Photo : Motor Cycle

hardest races of the season at the Czech. GP, the 8th round of the '69 Championship Series held on the 8.7mile Bruno circuit on July 20.

For almost half of the 350cc race, Gould duelled with the Italian ace. Again and again he notched the lead from Agostini exciting over 100,000 spectators around the course. Gould on a twostroke twin TR-2 set the fastest lap of

the race, though he finally settled for the second place. Agostini barely managed to take his three-cylinder MV home first making the best of handling and stamina advantages. Gould's Yamaha, however, deeply impressed spectators with marvellously high performance and reliability. His fastest lap was only 2 seconds outside M. Hailwood's record (Honda works racer).





Road Test

Low cost street scrambler Yamaha 50 YF5-C Trail

New trail bike models are sprouting up in all shapes and sizes to meet trail enthusiasm hotting up throughout the world. The latest trail model introduced in South Africa is the Yamaha YF5-C which is basically a redesigned version of the Yamaha YF5-S, the famous mini roadster.

The frame of the trail version is of a pressed steel T-design which is suitably versatile to give the machine excellent road holding on the normal road as well as enough rigidity for riding in rough surfaces.

This new mini trail version is intended to meet every demand of novice enthousiasts increasing in number in South Africa.

The following is a summary of road test conducted by a veteran rider of S. A. Motor Cyclist.

Rugged & Attractive Look

The tank is squat and nestles into the saddle and steering head to give the machine a suitable trail look. The bike is finished in candy red producing a wonderful harmony with the tank finished in white.

The saddle has an upswept rear section and is covered in non-slip vinyl. Other trail features include upswept and cross braced handlebars.

Effective Heat Guard

A well-silenced exhaust tube is upswept and covered by two separate heat shields, one for the lower U-tube section and



gearbox. Top speed is over 50 m.p.h.

the second for the muffler proper. The rear shock-absorbers and front

forks give the machine a comfortable ride wherever it goes. But it could do better for trail purpose with somewhat stiffer damping.

Satisfactory Performance

Maximum power output is 5 b. h. p. at 5,800 r.p.m which is sufficient to handle most riders up to 160 pounds, and provides the machine with a top speed around 52 m.p.h.

Yamaha Autolube system is a standard equipment which does an excellent job of keeping the machine properly lubricated most of the time.

Gearbox is a four-speeder, using the same ratios as the roadster. The multiplate wet clutch is fault-free and the same can be said for the gearbox which will work always smoothly.

The speeds through the gear respectively 15, 25, 40 and 53 m.p.h. for first, second, third and fourth. The little Yamaha is considerably quicker than many of the same capacity. This is due to the merits of gearing.

Off the Road

Turn off the road for a while and the little Yamaha performs so well with plenty of torque and an outstanding degree of climbing power for an engine of this capacity.

Stopping power with front and rear leading-shoe brakes is excellent. They always work well, stopping the machine in 32 feet at a speed of 32 m.p.h. Lights, fuel consumption and flickers are all up to present day standards or more, and will keep the rider safe at all times. The mini Yamaha trail proves a rare quality bike to satisfy every requirement of novice trail fans here.

TRAGIC DEATH OF BILL IVY

B. Ivy, one of the entrants for the East Germany Grand Prix International road race series 7, was killed while riding a Czechoslovakian JAWA works racer on July 12. While riding on the Sacsenring circuit next to G. Agostini on a MV 350, he was thrown from his machine and landed head first on the concrete wall. The accident was due to an overheated piston rod which raised the rear wheel and locked it Unfortunately, as he was thrown, his safety helmet came off resulting in a fractured skull. Taken to the nearest hospital and given emergency treatment B. Ivy just codldn't make it and passed away a young 27.

Ivy rode a Yamaha works racer in 105 and was entered as a fulltime member on the Yamaha team. In 1966 he displayed splendid racing skill while riding in various international championship road races. In 1967, he became the first to win titles on a Yamaha 125 works racer, and in 1967 he overcame the 100 m. p. h. barrier while riding in a T. T. race in the 125 cc class.

Though he was only 157 cm tall and 52 kg. he ran a pretty shrewd race. Off the circuit and on he was known to his friends as the "Light matchmaker" or the "Little giant". In 1969 he changed stables from Yamaha to JAWA works racers but dispite the change he gave all his many fans plenty of thrills. We sincerely regret his passing and offer our condolences to his family.


